Writing	This week you will be writing a diamante poem.  Before we start, we must be clear on the following grammatical terms (watch this video for examples).  • A noun – is a thing, a place, a person or an animal.  • An adjective – is a describing word.  • A verb - is a doing word or an action. *for diamante poems, verbs must end in 'ing'.  Look at the picture below (resource 1A) and make a list of nouns, adjectives and verbs that you can see.  Ask an adult to check your nouns, adjectives and verbs are correct.	Today you will plan a diamante poem about seasons.  A diamante poem has the following features (see resource 2A for example):  They are shaped like a diamond.  They usually compare two different things (e.g. summer and winter).  They are 7 lines long  (See resource 2B for an example planning format).  Draw (or find) pictures of your chosen seasons and create a word bank underneath each of them for the nouns, adjectives and verbs (ending in 'ing') you can see.	Write a diamante poem about the seasons (see resource 3A for example).  Remember to:  Use exciting word choices.  Use verbs ending in 'ing' (e.g. playing, talking, skipping).  Compare two different things (e.g. start with winter and end with summer).  Use resource 3B to help you write your poem.  When you have finished writing your poem, check it makes sense.	Today you will plan a diamante poem about anything you choose.  Some ideas you could use are:  Spring and autumn Earth and air Fire and ice Kings and Queens Mum and Dad School and home Heroes and villains  Draw (or find) two pictures of your chosen topics and create a word bank underneath each of them for the nouns, adjectives and verbs (ending in 'ing') you can see.	Today you will write a diamante poem about your chosen topics.  Use the same 'remember to' list from Wednesday. You can use resource 3B to help you write your poem.  When you have finished writing your poem, check it makes sense and try to improve a word choice.  Finished? Challenge yourself to read your diamante to a member of your household.

#### Rainbow writing


Write the word over and over again using different colours.
